Kimberley, 36, who plays a fiery netball teacher in the hit drama, said: "It was really fun playing the confrontation scenes, Jo just lost it.

But it can be hard juggling my career and having kids. I don't have a nanny or anything. But we have managed it so far.

Things come up so last minute with me and my work, so it's like 'OK, let's change the plan again'."

Kimberley has two sons - Cole, one, and Bobby, three. And she revealed this week that little Cole is now best pals with ex-bandmate Cheryl Tweedy's son Bear.
