Can you tell us about them?

I'm in Matthew Vaughan's latest film, Kingsman: The Secret Service, which hasn't been released here yet. It's based on a comic book and tells the story of a veteran secret agent, who leads a young guy called Eggsy into the world of espionage.

What character do you play?

Eggsy's mum. It's a really solid script with lots of action. Eggsy's a bit of an oikey, young James Bond. The cast is amazing - Colin Firth, Samuel L Jackson, Michael Caine... Sounds great... What's the other film? It's called One Night in Istanbul. It's a screen adaptation of the hit play about the exploits of a group of Liverpool football fans at the 2005 European Cup Final in Istanbul. 




to the footy action, it's also a bit of a rom-com. It was a great project for me as I'm a mad Liverpool fan. My husband, Mark, is in the film, too.

How did you find the time to make a couple of films?

I did them during the time out I had from



EastEnders. I love playing Ronnie, but she's such a dark and complex character. It does get tiring. It's great to be able to take time out to play different, lighter, less twisted roles. I'm very grateful to EastEnders that I'm able to do that.

Characters like the man-eating Tanya in Mount Pleasant?

Absolutely! Tanya's not such a predator in this series, though. She's been finding her old ways of getting gratification through coming on to men isn't working any more. She's not as manipulative as she was. I have such a laugh working on Mount Pleasant. We all do. I spend a lot of time between takes making up inappropriate lyrics to well-known songs!

What's it like working with *EastEnders* ex Nigel Harman, who plays your husband, Bradley, in *Mount Pleasant*?

I felt like I already knew him when we started working together. We have lots of mutual friends and it felt like we'd done a few jobs together - like EastEnders, where we tail-ended each other. Our first scenes together were straight in there. Physical, full-on bed scenes! It was challenging, but we got through it.

Did you manage to see Nigel as Simon Cowell in the musical *You Can't Sing* before it closed?

I was just about to go when it ended. I saw him play Simon at the National TV Awards, though. That was incredible. He just came on and launched into it. There was no introduction or anything. He was incredibly camp and I thought: 'What are you doing?!' It was only later that it became apparent. He must have had balls of steel to do that



and I'd have loved to see him at the London Palladium.

You're very much a family woman... How do you cope with working away from home, Mark and your two kids?

With Mount Pleasant, for instance, I'm flucky with the scheduling. Generally, I'll have a few days on set in Manchester, then a day or two back at home. It's nice

having a foot in my own kitchen, so to speak. When I was touring the UK in South Pacific a couple of years ago, Mark was the primary carer. But the year before that, he was very busy so the kids spent more time with me. I think it's healthy

when you're not working?

Recently, I seem to have entered a whole new equine way of life! There's a paddock at the back of our land at home in Bedfordshire, and we've rescued a couple of ponies that had been abandoned.
