Match scrapped after security blunder ■ 'Bomb' in loos was training aid

A TERROR scare that forced yesterday's Manchester United match to be called off was the result of a training exercise blunder. The 'bomb' discovered in toilets had been left there by a security company following a terror drill last week, police said. Tens of thousands of fans were advised out of Old Trafford over the alarm yesterday. Officers divided the game against Bournemouth should

be called off and summoned a bomb disposal team to deal with the device while the stadium was searched. A controlled explosion was carried out before the army experts confirmed the device was fake. John O'Hare, assistant chief constable of Greater Manchester Police, said: "We were very lucky that the bomb was a training aid and not a real one." **Continued on Page 4**

Tell us more about Penguin A&E.
I've been to South Africa to visit a hospital for penguins. I've loved penguins since I saw the penguin parade at Edinburgh Zoo as a kid. The penguins in South Africa are on the beach and are so inquisitive - they come off the beach and lay their eggs in people's gardens, which means they run the risk of becoming tame and not being able to live in the wild. Plus there are the usual hazards such as being eaten by sharks, swallowing fishing hooks and getting run over. At the hospital they are operated on and then released back into the wild. It's about saving the jockan penguin as there are only 50,000 left and there used to be millions.

Did you make friends with any of the penguins?
You can't touch them because they'll 'imprint' on you and get too close and then you can't put them back into the wild. Some are so badly injured they become residents in the hospital and one of them followed me around. I called him Sirus. You instinct is to pick them up and cuddle them, they're so soft and lovely.

Have you visited any other wildlife projects?
I've been to Africa several times. I went to Botswana to see elephants, Namibia to see cheetahs and last year I went to see gorillas in Uganda. We were so lucky the gorillas came out to see us. They smell of balsamic vinegar. They looked at us, farted like thunder, then toddled off. Their arse's many left because of the war. The anti-poaching people put their lives on the line for them.

Is it depressing to see wildlife being decimated?
With conservation issues, it's as if we're on the edge of a precipice. But it will be down to the next generation to right all the wrongs we've done. I find it uplifting to see people really working hard on these projects. It's not critical for penguins now but it's not good. I tend to be optimistic.

It's your ambition to go to South Georgia - why's that?
I'm hopefully going later this year. There are so many programs. It used to be a whaling station so there are still traces of people, but it's one of the last places left on Earth we haven't screwed up, so it would be nice to see it. And my

Who do you look forward to having on your sofa?
Oily Alexander from Years & Years. I adore that boy - I want to adopt him. He's been so open about his health with mental illness and that's so admirable. He's a wee lamb.

I'd interview anybody. It's interesting. Generally people with big egos aren't great. Marshi Carey was nice enough but not quite there. That was a long time ago. Has anyone unexpected told you they're a fan?
